## From Kenny...

I am glad to tell you all that the doctor has signed me fit to be back at work. Not that I haven't been working since December, but I was supposed to be on



"light duties". So, how did that work out for me? Well, I'm afraid not too well, and it's been some time since I missed anything because I considered it "heavy duty"! I'm not that sort of priest or person. Liz has also been a tremendous support, without whom my job would be impossible.

Much has been achieved in the five months of "light duty", in both parishes, and there is much to be positive about. I've learned to be a lot more positive about myself, and most of you will have found me to be much more relaxed of late. I have the most incredible GP, prayer works, and I'm approaching things more confidently than I was this time last year. All good, but I must be kind to myself if depression and anxiety are to be kept at bay.

I have carried a little card in my wallet for many years now, and I haven't read it or acted upon it for a while. It's a "Just for Today" card, which reminds me that I only live in today. Yesterday is gone and there's nothing much I can do about it. Tomorrow is not here yet, with all the projections and problems I can create in my own mind; worry and anxiety about the future being character defects which I am working hard at removing.

I try to live in today, and simply deal with today's problems and issues in the best way I can. So, just for today....

- I will try to live through this day only and not tackle my whole life problem at once. I can do something for twelve hours that would appal me if I felt that I had to keep it up for a lifetime.
- I will be happy. Most folks are as happy as they make up their own minds to be.
- I will adjust to what is and not try to adjust everything to my own desires. I will take my "luck" as it comes and fit myself to it.

- I will try to strengthen my mind. I will study. I will learn something useful. I will not be a mental loafer. I will read something that requires effort, thought and concentration.
- I will exercise my soul in three ways: I will do someone a good turn and not get found out. If anybody knows of it, it will not count. I will do at least two things that I don't want to do – just for exercise. I will not show anyone that my feelings are hurt; they may be hurt, but today I will not show it.
- I will be agreeable. I will look as well as I can, dress becomingly, talk quietly, act courteously, criticise not one bit, not find fault with anything, and not try to improve or regulate anybody except myself.
- I will save myself from at least two pests; hurry, indecision, negativity, self-blame, are but some of the things that can hinder my life.
- I will have a quiet half-hour, all by myself, and relax. During this half-hour, sometime, I may be still with God or will try to get a better perspective of my life.
- I will be unafraid. Especially, I will be unafraid to enjoy what is beautiful, and to believe that as I give to the world, so the world will give to me.

Many of us will have a giggle at this, and think it is an impossible path to follow, but even if we take one or two of these, and implement them, our lives will be more happy and improved.

Jesus certainly made it clear that we were not to worry about tomorrow. Today is really the only day we have and we must learn to make the best of it!

Many of these things help me, and I would encourage you to give some of it a try. The Kingdom of God is a "today" thing. We can enjoy the fruits of the Kingdom if we choose to, today.

I am glad to be "officially" back among you, fit and ready to continue from the dark places of October and November of last year. I invite you to share my joy, and give thanks to God for it!

## **Exciting times ahead for St Mungo's!**

The leamy foundation

Through the hard work of Fr Kenny, and the Executive of the Leamy Foundation, the 'Climate Challenge Fund' has awarded the Garden Project a fabulous grant of £64,000 for the 'Carbon Sprouts' project.





The St Mungo's Garden Project aims to be a positive resource for the wider community and will take place in the grounds of St Mungo's Church, Alexandria. The project will involve school children, voluntary groups and residents, including those experiencing issues with financial hardship or confidence. Through the growing of vegetables, herbs and flowers in a number of raised beds and tubs in the church grounds, the project will increase climate change and carbon reduction awareness. The projects' workshops will demonstrate how people can further reduce their carbon footprint by choosing locally produced food, reducing food waste and improving budgeting and cooking skills. By June 1<sup>st</sup> a full time Project Officer will be employed to work with Fr Kenny and the Executive to oversee the outreach and work from the grounds of St Mungo's. On Sunday, 26<sup>th</sup> April, Fr Kenny and Kevin Mason met with the congregation to explain fully the details, advantages and vision of the project.

Work has already begun with the local Guides and Brownies, and the photos show the first of their horticultural and carbon reduction awareness training days held on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> April. The girls had great fun planting strawberries, wild flowers and brussel sprouts, accompanied by their leader Ruth, while learning about climate change and how they can reduce their carbon footprint. We look forward to seeing the results of their green fingers!

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## MARGARET HARRISON Peace protester and co-founder of Faslane Peace Camp 1918 - 2015



#### Dumbarton born, Margaret Harrison, a lifelong Episcopalian and committed worshipper at St Augustine's and St Mungo's has died at the age of 96.

Holding strong Christian beliefs, Margaret, from a young age, kept close to her heart Jesus' command to love one another. From this core belief she pursued a colourful life of non-violent protest as she dedicated herself to helping to end what she saw as the scandals of world poverty and war. She was a visible presence at the marches at Aldermaston in the 1950s and 1960s where she walked 52 miles carrying placards between London and Berkshire; in 1961 she spent her first night in jail as the first Scottish lady arrested for anti-nuclear activism; and in 1991 she was thrown out of the Houses of Parliament for causing a disturbance. A lifelong member of the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, Margaret was detained at Her Majesty's pleasure 14 times for protesting against Polaris and Trident missiles. Her most notable achievement, however, was the founding, with her husband Bobby, of the Peace Camp at Faslane in Argyll and Bute in 1982. There, the first protesters camped in make shift tents but later it turned into a camp of caravans which housed a dedicated group of 20 protesters. The camp still exists today, a silent, but resolute presence and reminder of a different option to the solution of nuclear weapons.

Margaret was born in Dennystown, Dumbarton in 1918 and attended Knoxland Primary and Dumbarton Academy. Her happy childhood was spent in the east end of the town, where she often

escaped to the glen to pick primroses and skilfully avoided the eagle eyes of Lord Overtoun's gamekeeper. She met her husband Bobby whilst cycling through the Trossachs and began her happy married life in 1945. They had two daughters, Ruth and Anne who gave Margaret and Bobby five beautiful grandchildren and six beloved great-grandchildren. Margaret in her youth was a member of the Scottish People's Theatre (SPT), and later Dumbarton People's Theatre enjoying being part of productions such as Romeo and Juliet. Having a good sense of humour, Margaret also loved to entertain audiences with amusing recitations in which she played the many parts herself putting on different voices and accents. Margaret's lifetime achievements were acknowledged publicly when she was awarded the Freedom of Dumbarton.

For her whole life Margaret devoted herself to peace. She was a poet and inspired many by the actions she took and the words she spoke. She will be remembered with affection and admiration by the communities of Dumbarton and Alexandria.

There will be a Memorial Service in thanksgiving for Margaret's life in St Mungo's Episcopal Church, Alexandria, on Saturday, May 16<sup>th</sup> at 1pm.



It is about this time of year that travel companies start bringing out a whole host of brochures to try and entice us to book our summer holidays. I don't normally go for these early pitches – but to my

surprise I found myself signing a week's deal for the family in a chalet near Oxford in the summer. Staying in Oxfordshire means that I will be able to show the children where I grew up, went to school, and even take them punting (oh, the fun!!). It also means I can take them to visit loads and loads of churches in the area (you can hear the groans already!). I suspect it will turn into what the children have resignedly come to call an 'ABC' holiday ('Another Bloomin' Church' holiday)!

Yes, I have to admit it, we have visited quite a few churches in our time. Phil enjoys reading the historic plaques... I enjoy soaking up the atmosphere... and the children.... well, they've kinda got used to it. I enjoy seeing the great variety of church interior lay-outs, the different furnishings used and imagining how people worshipped in the past... but occasionally, I find myself wondering whether the church I am in is still "alive and kicking"? Sometimes it's hard to get any sense of vitality, of the life and rhythm of that faith community for that week, that Sunday, that day. Often there's nothing around to give me any sort of hint of it at all. It can sometimes feel that perhaps I've mistakenly visited a building taken over by the National Trust... a building preserved to remember a glorious time past... a sacred history that should be confined to old photographs, pictures and books... and where God is represented through dusty old statues and ancient artefacts. When confronted by this I do find myself asking – is this what the Church is about?

The churches I get the most from, and get excited about, are the ones which have visible signs that things are happening... that Christ is alive and active... that the resident faith community are 'living stones'... enjoying their faith... doing fabulous work in the community. I can think of Salisbury Cathedral with its stunning font from which water continually flows from each of its four corners... St Andrew's Cathedral in Glasgow with its breathtaking Lady Chapel and imaginative cloister garden space... churches with in-laid labyrinths and peaceful prayer gardens... St Martin-in-the-Field's with its Crypt Cafe... the Church of Scotland church in Perthshire which was purpose built with a cafe, children's soft play and badminton courts attached...... These and many more like it gladden my heart and give me hope in my faith. Yes... the Holy Spirit IS still with us and prompting us to be creative.

All of this has come into my mind as I have watched the exciting developments which are taking place at St Mungo's. Not only is the Foodbank becoming well established in the community and doing vital work with those in need, but the Garden Project is now beginning to take shape. The plans are drawn up, the raised beds prepared, the new shoots are emerging from the soil, the seeds are being sown in the ground ... all of these things speak of new life, community life, Kingdom life and new growth in the Spirit. And for that I rejoice. For all of that I give thanks.

In St Augustine's the flexibility of the beautiful interior encourages in practical ways the life of the community to flourish as we enjoy music nights, murder mysteries, the Foodbank provision, the variety of services, school visits and Passover meals. There is no hint here of a well preserved mausoleum. And for that also I rejoice and give thanks.

This year promises to be exciting. If we continue to listen and respond to the promptings of the Spirit life in all its abundance will flourish. I give thanks that I will be sharing it with you all.

## **MONEY TO STOP THE LEAKS!**

Just before Christmas 2014 it was brought to the Vestry's attention that a Roof Repair Grant could be applied for — for churches in Scotland, with a deadline of 30th January. St Mungo's had applied to the Dunderdale Fund for some emergency repairs and it was suggested that we apply to have the whole roof and gutters checked out and repaired.



The Vestry decided to apply, despite a very tight timeline, downloaded the form and started getting organized in filling in the form. The diocesan architect was contacted and a meeting set up to see if we could do

everything by the deadline. This required some 13 documents and the actual form to deal with. To cut a long story short the deadline was met with 2 days to spare with the Diocesan Architect's help in timescales, report and costings, and with members of the Vestry helping out considerably with the taking of photographs and supplying information. It was no mean feat of determination!



We were well rewarded when we received word that we had been successful and were to be given a grant of £33,500! Other churches in the Diocese had applied for the same grant but had been refused - so thanks to Rebecca and all who

helped to make this possible!

If everything goes to plan a new slated roof with new leadwork should be in place before the winter. We will then turn our minds and muscles to decorating the interior once the building is watertight. Have your paintbrushes and rollers ready!

### THE CORDALE BELL



Some of the congregation will remember the Bell that sat on the far left hand side of the Altar for decades before being moved to the porch for another number of decades. The

Bell was gifted to St. Mungo's by The United Turkey Red Coy. Ltd after the closure of the Cordale Works in Renton for safe keeping and for us to make use of. It was rung at Easter, Christmas and the New Year services and occasionally at other times during the year.

However, in 2002 it was decided to loan the Bell to Loch Lomond Shores to be put on public display near the Children's Play area. This proved very popular with the children and visitors, who continually rang it all day long. After about 2 years of ringing the clanger had a rubber sheath put over it to dull the sound, as the local housing estate nearby complained about the noise. Eventually the clapper was removed, and the Bell locked down so that it could not be moved or swung. People then continued to hit it with rocks and stones to make it ring and the Bell fell into disrepair with a rusting bearings mechanism and it became a sorry sight.

The Vestry was then approached to get the Bell back before any further damage could be done.



Lomond Shores management agreed to restore it to its original condition and give it back; it is presently in a workshop being repaired.

So look out for the Cordale Bell

when it returns to St. Mungo's, possibly as a feature of the community garden being prepared in the grounds! *Jim Biddulph*
